A big hello from Cat Welfare Society

On the 27 March 2009, a new committee was voted in at Cat Welfare Society's 10th Annual General Meeting (AGM). Held at NVPC - The Giving Place

at Central, the meeting saw new president Ang Li Tin taking over the baton from Dr Michelle Lee, who will continue to serve as an adviser in the society.

In the past year, CWS grappled with fundamental issues such as manpower and funding, as well as figuring our way around the entire cat welfare ecosystem.

Keeping CWS afloat remained our main purpose so we continued to provide financial assistance for the dedicated caregivers around the island by offering sterilisation reimbursements, as well as medical reimbursements for the treatment of cats in life-

threatening situations.

CWS also tirelessly provided subsidised sterilisation slots that were coordinated by then-administrative manager, Wiggie Lim.

With the new committee voted in, we reviewed the internal operations. As we have been running on operating deficit in 2008, we have to cut down on expenditure. So to

maintain our current reserves, we have reluctantly decided to suspend the medical reimbursement scheme for now.

And despite the recession, we aim to raise even more funds this year so that we can continue to give financial assistance to caregivers. This is so they can maintain the Trap-Neuter-Return-Management programmes in their estates.

There are also plans to harness the power of social media to spread the word about upcoming events, news and other updates, as well as educate the general public about cat welfare issues.

We hope to garner more support to fight ignorance against the misconceptions and intolerance of our community cats, and will continue to work towards a harmonious society filled with happy humans and cats.

Spay Day saves lives

Caregivers, vets and volunteers joined hands on Spay Day, a Cat Welfare Society (CWS) annual event, to put 157 cats on the path to a better life last October. Neo Kai Ling reports.

On 31 October 2008, 157 cats in Singapore were off to a better life –they were sterilised in the annual CWS Spay Day.

Preparations for Spay Day began months earlier. The Spay Day 2008 Planning Committee was set up with the aim of ensuring that the entire event could be carried out smoothly – from generating publicity to securing subsidised sterilisation slots to confirming the participation of caregivers and volunteers to the charting of transport routes and preparation of logistics.

Rebecca Ho, one of the Spay Day 2008 Planning Committee members, believes that sterilisation "gives cats a better life after sterilisation".

Caregivers submitted their requests for slots weeks prior to the event. They then had to trap their community cats the night before and make sure they fast through the night in preparation for the operation. On that morning, the cats were brought to the four drop-off points at Ang Mo Kio, Boon Lay, Tampines and Bedok.

Our volunteers were stationed at each of these drop-off points as coordinators who ensured that all cats were tagged and secured. They were then transported to the 22 participating vet clinics island-wide. On the same evening, the sterilised cats were transported back to the same drop-off points where they were returned to their caregivers.

CWS is extremely grateful to the 22 vets for agreeing to be part of this event by providing subsidised sterilisation slots and displaying Spay Day posters at their clinics: Allpets & Aqualife Pte Ltd, AMK Veterinary Surgery, AAVC - Animal & Avian Veteri-

Likewise, CWS would like to thank all the volunteers, transport companies, caregivers and vets who have helped in Spay Day in one way or another. Without your enthusiastic support, Spay Day 2008 would not have been possible. A big thank-you to all!

* Sterilisation

CWS acts as a voice for the network of caregivers in Singapore and assists them in their work by providing emotional support, helping with the negotiations with the authorities, as well as providing highly subsidised sterilisation slots at selected vet clinics.

* Education

Through roadshows and events, CWS informs and educates the public on the benefits of sterilisation for the cats and the community.

* Adoption

On the CWS website, fosterers can help their cats and kittens find good homes by listing them on the Adoption Bulletin. Interested adopters can contact the fosterers directly.

* Mediation

CWS works with its network of caregivers and town councils to resolve residents' complaints about cats.
